Asia Pacific

The Asia Pacific Chapter held a quarterly chapter meeting on 11 May, 2022, in Perth, Australia, attended by 5 in person and 10 online. There were two technical presentations/discussions on CCUS. The first by Peter Stephenson was on the physics of CCUS, the importance of phase behaviour, effect of impurities, factors affecting storage capacity and key differences between storage in depleted fields and deep aquifers. There was a lively discussion about potential thermal shock caused by phase changes. The second discussion was by William Walton on the SPE SRMS, how to apply it, definition of discovery and inaccessible storage resources, the requirements for different storage resource classifications and economic assessment. The next meeting is scheduled for July/August 2022 with a discussion on potentially suppressed uncertainty with experimental design.


Membership Report




Key items:


Financial Report

The Society continues to remain financially healthy. Revenue for SPEE International in 2021 was \$115,888 and expenses totaled \$176,928 yielding a net loss of \$61,040, which compared to a budgeted net loss of approximately \$34,000. The difference is largely attributed to higher Professional Fees as a result of hiring our new SPEE Administrative Assistant, Andrea Bracho. Debbie Suter remained in her role as SPEE Executive Assistant until her recent retirement. Cash assets held by SPEE International at the end of 2021 in checking and money market accounts plus CDs totaled \$532,851.


The chart below shows the financial performance of SPEE International for 2017 through 2021. Overall, the Society had been operating at a profit since 2017. However, owing primarily to the cancellation of the Annual Meetings in 2020 and 2021, postponed training courses, and investments in upgrades to the website, losses have been incurred over the last two years. Coming out of the pandemic, 2022 will be a transition year financially as the Society returns to in-person annual meetings and provides additional training opportunities.



The charts below summarize the principal sources of revenue and expenses over the last several years. The increased revenue in 2017 and 2018 was associated with a very active training program for Monograph 4.



Forecasting revenue and expenses for the 2022 Annual Meeting was challenging. Information from the recent Annual Meeting will be helpful as we prepare the 2023 budget. G&A and Miscellaneous expenses in 2022 are expected to be essentially flat to 2021 levels.



The financial reserves of the Society are healthy. The Society has weathered the storm of the pandemic and is back on a path to providing in-person meetings, training events, and future monograph publications. PRMS Guidelines for Applications of the Petroleum Resources Management System Update

The SPE Oil and Gas Reserves Committee, along with many other volunteers, is hoping to have the "Applications Guidelines" or "AG," the companion document to the PRMS, ready for release before year end. Updated to reflect PRMS 2018, the AG should be about twice as long as the 2011 version and will include two new chapters, Petrophysics and Reservoir Simulation. The chapter on Unconventional Resources Estimation has been greatly expanded to reflect the many changes that have occurred in the last decade. The new AG will also be accompanied by a list of FAQs and numerous examples. Some of the examples will be integrated into the AG, while others will be available electronically as stand-alone examples. Both the examples and FAQs are designed to be evergreen in the sense they can be updated as necessary as comments and questions are received. SPEE's own Charles Vanorsdale is serving as editor and deserves your appreciation for a tremendous effort.



We regret to note the passing of
Harry J. Helwerda
Calgary, Alberta
26 August, 1955 – 14 June, 2022

It is with sadness and heavy hearts that we announce the peaceful passing of Harry Helwerda on Tuesday, June 14, 2022, at the age of 66. Harry fought Glioblastoma courageously for 17 months, never giving up, living with hope and continuing to love life despite all he faced.

Harry was born and raised in Calgary where he lived, worked, and spent his whole life. Family was paramount to Harry; he was very proud of his family and was overjoyed to have become a grandpa this past January.

Harry graduated from the University of Calgary in 1978 with a B.Sc. in Civil Engineering. He accepted a position with Mobil Oil as a Reservoir Engineer in Calgary and learned as much as possible about reservoir engineering and the oil industry. After four years of working on various projects at Mobil, Harry accepted a position with the consulting firm Lewis Engineering as an Evaluations Engineer in 1981. The new challenges of working in a fast-paced environment on multiple projects for different companies suited Harry's personality and attention to detail well.



The Calgary Oil Patch was hit hard in 1982 by the Federal Government's National Energy Program, which ushered in the first of the many bust and boom cycles that Harry would experience over his career. Unfortunately, Lewis Engineering folded in 1983, and Harry moved to the successor company Keplinger Canada Engineering as an Evaluations Supervisor. Two years later, Keplinger met the same fate. Harry started his own company Preco Petroleum Consulting in 1985.

In 1989 Sproule became one of Harry's clients, working as a contract consultant doing reserves evaluations. Six months later, in 1990, a full-time position opened up at Sproule and Harry joined the firm as an Evaluations Engineer. He quickly became an Associate of the Company in 1991 in recognition of his contributions to the company. Harry brought his existing clients which remained with Sproule due to Harry's long working relationships with them. Harry's previous consulting experience and running his own company helped him quickly advance at Sproule, becoming a Manager of Engineering in 1994, a Director in 1997, Vice-President of Engineering in 1999, Senior Vice-President in 2006 and Executive Vice President in 2007. In June of 2013, Harry became President of Sproule and retired as President and COO in 2016.

Harry was a member of the Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists of Alberta (APEGA), SPE and SPEE. Harry was very active in the industry, giving selflessly of his time to various committees. These included the APEGA Board of Examiners from 1999 to 2008, the Nominating Committee of APEGA from 2008 to 2016, and the Alberta Securities Commission Petroleum Advisory Committee in 2012. He was also actively involved in the SPEE Calgary Chapter and served as Chairman in 2011 and 2012.

In June 2010, Harry was recognized by his peers for his exceptional contributions to the engineering profession in Canada by being conferred as Fellow Engineers Canada (FEC). Harry was also recognized in 2013 for his contributions to the Geoscience profession by being vested as a Fellow of Geoscientists Canada (FGC). Harry's Hat Trick of recognition was Sproule's recognition as one of Canada's Best Managed Companies in 2016 while he was President.

Is It Ethical, Moral And Legal?

A great deal has been written about ethics and a great deal more will be. Why? Because Ethics is a soft term and defined by other soft terms. Consequently, when ethics is taught or discussed, it normally uses the presentation of situations and then discusses them. We do this because ethics is a moving target. What is ethical to one person is not ethical to another person. It changes because of ethnicity, gender, culture, socioeconomic background, religion and government rules. The agencies governing professional registration require recurring training in ethics. So SPEE includes one hour of ethics at each SPEE Annual Meeting.

For purposes of this discussion, accept these short definitions as they pertain to this topic:

ETHICAL: The boundaries of behavior placed on people by that society.

MORAL: The boundaries of behavior established by the individual.

LEGAL: The boundaries placed on persons by laws and regulations.

Accepting these boundaries, we can move on. Ethics is an important topic, and it is discussed everywhere. Why? I think because we don't have a good grasp of it, and it is important to be a self-governing society. I am not talking about SPEE but the greater society of humankind.

Our society even teaches ethics to children. Recently, I read about a new merit badge offered by the Boy Scouts of America, or Scouts USA, as they are now called. The new merit badge is titled "Citizenship in Society." Unlike all other merit badges, they did not publish a pamphlet or training manual. They simply published a seven-page document with the requirements and instructions for the scouts and councilors. They open with: "The focus of the Citizenship in Society merit badge is to provide you with information on diversity, equity, inclusion, and ethical leadership." That is a lot to cover in one merit badge. The guidance goes on to say: "The process of earning this merit badge will be different, as it intentionally places the responsibility of research and identification of resources on you instead of using a merit badge pamphlet." Their first four requirements ask questions about ethical leadership and ethical decision making. They leave the definition and discussion of ethics completely up to the scout. I hardly think a twelve-year-old has that in-depth understanding of ethics. Society is struggling with ethics, which is why it emerges in so many places, like annual refresher training.

Speaking of requirements, the Texas Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors (PELS) implemented in 2017 a third requirement for registration. In addition to the Fundamentals of Engineering Examination and the Principles and Practices of Engineering Examination, they added a Professional Conduct and Ethics Examination. It is open book, and you must achieve a passing grade. All the questions refer to situations that are addressed in the PELS Published Rules. Because our state consists of people from so many backgrounds with different values, the PELS established standardized ethics in the state of Texas by codifying ethical behavior in the regulations. Since 2017, thirteen other states established Ethics Examinations for registration.

Where are your ethical, moral and legal boundaries? Do they align with your society?

W. John Lee holds the DVG Endowed Chair in petroleum engineering at Texas A&M University. Prior to this position, he held the Hugh Roy and Lillie Cranz Cullen Distinguished University Chair at the University of Houston's petroleum engineering program from 2011 to 2015. Still earlier, Lee was a professor of petroleum engineering at Texas A&M from 1977 to 2011. He was the former executive vice president of S.A. Holditch & Associates, where he specialized in reservoir engineering for unconventional gas reservoirs. He served as an Academic Engineering Fellow with the US Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) in Washington during 2007–2008 and was a principal architect of the modernized SEC rules for reporting oil and gas reserves.

Prior to beginning his career in academia, Lee managed Exxon's Major Fields Study Group. He has written many technical papers and four SPE textbooks: Well Testing, Gas Reservoir Engineering, Pressure Transient Testing, and Applied Well Test Analysis. Lee is an Honorary Life Member of SPEE, an Honorary Member of SPE and a member of the US National Academy of Engineering. He received his BChE, MS, and PhD degrees in chemical engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology.

Prior to beginning his career in academia, Lee managed Exxon's Major Fields Study Group. He has written many technical papers and four SPE textbooks: Well Testing, Gas Reservoir Engineering, Pressure Transient Testing, and Applied Well Test Analysis. Lee is an Honorary Life Member of SPEE, an Honorary Member of SPE and a member of the US National Academy of Engineering. He received his BChE, MS, and PhD degrees in chemical engineering from the Georgia Institute of Technology.

Recap of the 2022 SPEE Annual Meeting

- Short Course 3 on Sunday afternoon: Carbon Capture, Utilization and Storage and the CO2 Storage Resources Management System (SRMS) presented by Rawdon Seager from Gaffney Cline.

Four technical sessions were presented on Monday morning. - Debbie Suter was given a token of appreciation for her services as the SPEE Executive Assistant from 2015 to 2022.




