

ANNUAL MEETING SUMMARY

A robust and exciting agenda of **short courses** and technical talks has been scheduled. Short courses will be offered on Saturday morning, Sunday morning, and Tuesday afternoon, plus half-day technical sessions on Monday and Tuesday mornings. Short course topics include CCUS and SRMS, Monograph 5, and PowerBI Applications for Reserves and Reservoir Engineering.

During the **technical program sessions** on Monday and Tuesday, participants will hear relevant presentations on Private Equity, A&D Markets, the Annual Survey of Parameters, PRMS guidelines, and Auto-forecasting. In addition, topics in the emerging areas of Energy Transition, Unconventional Enhanced Recovery, Carbon Capture Utilization and Storage, and Geothermal Applications for Oil & Gas will be presented. For the ethics requirement, participants will hear a unique perspective from a former Enron executive.

Situated on Goat Island and surrounded by the picturesque Newport Harbor and Narragansett Bay, **Newport Harbor Island Resort** is a short walk from the heart and history of the charming waterfront cobblestone streets of Newport. The area offers abundant and affordable attractions and activities, including great restaurants, live music, landmark mansions, museums, aquariums, golf courses, beaches, state parks, scenic walks, and cruises. 
HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS


Financial Report

Revenues for the Society continued to recover during 2022, as the in-person Annual Meeting resumed and training courses were held. Revenues for SPEE International during 2022 were \$305,703 and expenses totaled \$339,743, yielding a net loss of \$34,040. The difference in 2022 actual versus our budgeted net income of approximately \$5,000 is largely attributable to differences in estimates for the 2022 Annual Meeting. Information from this first post-pandemic Annual Meeting was helpful in planning future budgets and the 2023 Annual Meeting. The Society remains financially healthy with cash and cash equivalent assets held by SPEE International at the end of 2022 totaling approximately \$500,000.


The chart below shows the financial performance of SPEE International for 2018 through 2022. Overall, the Society had been operating at a profit prior to the pandemic and successfully limited losses the past few years. The budget for 2023 includes an estimated net income of approximately \$80,000, as we continue to tweak plans for the Annual Meeting, hybrid training opportunities, and cash management.



The charts on the following page summarize the principal sources of revenue and expenses over the last five years. Dues and publication revenues have largely held steady in recent years. With the resumption of training courses and the in-person Annual Meeting in 2022, revenues from these two sources returned during 2022 and are estimated to continue to increase during 2023.




Expenses during 2022 were near pre-pandemic levels, as expected. Budgeted expenses associated with the 2023 Annual Meeting and with G&A and Misc. during 2023 are estimated to be slightly lower than corresponding expenses during 2022.





Is It Ethical To Take Two Desserts?

An Adaptation of Dr. Christopher E. Mathewson

Dr. Mathewson, PhD, PE, PG was a professor at Texas A&M University and Board member of the Texas Geological Board. He liked talking about ethics and this article is adapted from his talk.

First, let me review for purposes of this article the definitions of Moral, Ethical, and Legal.

Moral: The boundaries of behavior established by the individual.

Ethical: The boundaries of behavior placed on people by that society.

Legal: The boundaries of behavior placed on people by laws, rules, and regulations.

There is a natural progression of behavior boundaries from Moral to Ethical to Legal. So we see those boundaries codified into law when people exceed their moral and ethical boundaries. For example, it used to be unethical to plagiarize another's work, now it has become against the law. The modern electronic environment makes it "easier" to plagiarize. College students think they can do this, and the professor will not know. However, the professors have tools to research the students' work for plagiarism and the consequences are failing the course or removal from the school.

Now onto the "Cookie Model of Ethics." Suppose someone from your office decides to bring cookies to the office for everyone to enjoy. Large, delicious cookies! There are eight people in this office and the person brings eight cookies, one for each person. After all, they are large cookies. However, one self-centered, entitled person with no consideration for others takes two cookies, leaving someone without a cookie. Do we see this as unethical behavior? The answer is yes. The individual's moral behavior boundary is only consideration of self. Their ethical behavior boundary is to place self before society. Unfortunately, there was no legal violation at this time. However, the next time a person brings a tray of cookies, we see a codification into a rule because of the breakdown of ethics and a sign appears on the counter by the tray of cookies, "One Cookie Only Please!" Thus, in this Cookie Model, we see the development of behavior boundaries from Moral, Ethical and onto Legal.

Citing a different situation, a vendor brings a large tray of fried chicken-stuffed breakfast rolls to the office (aka Chick-Fil-A Chicken Minis). There are numerous rolls, enough for everyone to have several. However, once again, a self-centered, entitled person chooses to take numerous chicken bites from the tray leaving the empty rolls on the tray. This behavior is done to the exclusion of others in the office. Can we define this as "Unethical?" Of course we do.

Now, onto another setting to illustrate the situational ethics of taking two cookies. This time you have gone out to a restaurant or buffet and your wait staff brings to the table a large tray of numerous types of dessert and says "Help yourself" or you go by the dessert display of the buffet and there is a virtual bounty of different desserts, each one looking just as wonderful as the next. Is it ethical to take two desserts this time? Yes, because the proprietor expects people to take more than one dessert and has prepared for that.

Many will be familiar with this example: "The middle seat on Southwest Airlines" and other discount airlines that have no seat assignments. How many feel entitled or hopeful that no one will take the middle seat on the row, therefore giving us more room on the plane. We put newspapers, coats, briefcases or other items to discourage people from taking the seat. We are not entitled to that seat and in most cases we have not purchased that seat either. On the other hand, how many of you have travelled with your family with young children and purchased a seat for that young child because of safety and you did not want to hold them in your lap for the trip? It is an oversold flight and the airline employee challenges you for that seat. Once again, moral, ethical, and legal is at play in our everyday lives.

In closing, let me go back to the beginning, "Is it Ethical to Take Two Desserts?" The answer is sometimes yes but frequently no. Again situational.

Moral is your boundaries of behavior, Ethical is society's boundaries of behavior and Legal is the boundaries of behavior placed by rules, laws, and regulations. Over time Moral and Ethical boundaries become codified into rules, laws, and regulations because of behavior changes or expectations of people. Let us hope that taking two desserts does not become against the law!
